Ayobámi Adébáyo is the author of Stay with Me which won the 9mobile Prize for Literature and was shortlisted for the Bailey's Prize for Women's Fiction, the Wellcome Book Prize and the Kwani? Manuscript Prize. Her second novel is a A Spell of Good Things.

Patrick Barkham is an award-winning author and natural history writer for the Guardian. His books include The Butterfly Isles, Badgerlands, Islander and Wild Child. He is President of

Norfolk Wildlife Trust and lives in Norfolk with his family. Polly Crosby grew up on the Suffolk coast, and now lives with her husband and son in Norfolk. In 2018, Polly won Curtis Brown Creative's Yesterday

Scholarship. She was awarded runner-up in the Bridport Prize for her debut novel, The Illustrated Child, and received the Annabel Abbs Writing Scholarship at the University of East Anglia. Polly's third novel, Vita & the Birds, came out in May.

Richard Hawking is the author of At the Field's Edge: Adrian Bell and the English Countryside, the first critical monograph of Bell's writing appraising his observations about the ecology, economy and culture of the British countryside. He is currently working with Slightly Foxed to compile and introduce a quartet of seasonal volumes of Bell's A Countryman's Notebook essays from his extensive archives.


Emmanuel Iduma is the author, most recently, of I Am Still With You, a memoir on the aftermath of the Nigerian civil war. His nonfiction and criticism have been published widely, including in Granta, and the New York Review of Books. He was awarded a Windham-Campbell Prize for nonfiction

Patrick Barkham

In conversation with Richard Hawking

In writing The Swimmer: The Wild Life of Roger Deakin, Patrick Barkham took on an extraordinarily difficult task. How does one do justice to a writer such as Deakin, so universally loved and so impossible to pin down? How does one capture the irrepressible essence of a 'complicated' man of such varied interests and enthusiasms, whom one has never met? Barkham will talk about his method of researching and constructing this unique work of 'creative biography' - drawn from Deakin's notebooks, diaries, letters, recordings, published works and early drafts. Told largely in Deakin's voice, this is a highly innovative form of biography - melding Deakin's words with his own, interspersed with extracts, poems and recollections from friends.

Two of Nigeria's brightest literary stars discuss their work and practice. Ayobámi Adébáyo, an alumnus from the UEA's MA in Creative Writing, won multiple awards for her debut novel Stay With Me. Her highly anticipated second novel A Spell of Good Things was released in 2023. Emmanuel Iduma is a Nigerian writer, editor, critic and photographer, and the recipient of the Windham Campbell Prize. His memoir about the Nigerian Civil War, I Am Still With You, explores the disappearance of his uncle during the Biafran War. Emmanuel and Ayobami will discuss their books, the importance of prizes and how to combine writing, marriage and childcare!

Blake Morrison

In conversation with Paddy O'Connell

Poet, novelist and memoirist Blake Morrison is one of Suffolk's best-loved authors. His extraordinary new memoir Two Sisters explores his relationships with his sister and half-sister, as well as examining sibling relationships in history and literature. The death of Blake's sister Gill is the starting point for this moving and unflinching account of family relationships, in which he also uncovers the story of his half-sister Josie.



Blake Morrison is a poet, novelist and the author of two bestselling memoirs, And When Did You Last See Your Father? and Things My Mother Never Told Me. His Suffolk-based novel The Last Weekend was adapted for television and his poetry collection Shingle Street explores the North Sea coast. His latest books, both published this year, are a memoir, Two Sisters, and a poetry pamphlet, Skin & Blister.

Paddy O'Connell presents BBC Radio 4's Broadcasting House programme every Sunday morning. He is an occasional presenter on R4's PM programme and on Radio 2. Paddy began his broadcasting career in 1989 on the BBC's local trainee scheme, has worked as a local radio reporter, for Radio 5 Live and as the BBC News North America Business Correspondent, based in New York City. His career highs include commentating on the Eurovision Song Contest and being a founder member of the Low House Litfest team.

Kate Sawver worked as an actor. producer and wrote several short films before turning her hand to fiction. Her debut novel, The Stranding, was shortlisted for the Costa First Novel Award, won the East Anglian fiction prize, was adapted for BBC Radio 4 Book at Bedtime and is currently being developed for TV. Kate is the host of weekly podcast Novel Experience. After twenty years in London, she recently returned to her native East Anglia, where, as a solo mother by choice, she lives with her young daughter.

Emma Shercliff is a literary agent with over 20 years of experience in the publishing industry. In 2020, she founded Laxfield Literary Associates as a response to the lack of literary agents outside London. She provides representation for authors in Suffolk and Norfolk, and writers from under-represented backgrounds. Her clients include Kalaf Epalanga, Heather Parry, Tom Shakespeare and Luke Wright.

Charlotte Seymour began her career as a literary scout, before becoming an agent in 2015. She was named a Bookseller Rising Star in 2021, and in 2022 she joined Johnson & Alcock, where she continues to build a list across fiction and non fiction.


